Three Historic Buildings Still Serving

Coeur d'Alene architect George Williams worked in Coeur d'Alene for 23 years designing many prominent buildings including the Masonic Temple at 6th and Sherman, over 20 schools including the Roosevelt and the old Bryan School, the First United Methodist Church at 7th and Wallace, the Elks' Temple at 5th and Lakeside and a three-story brick boarding house for Harvey Davey at 315 Wallace. He also designed buildings in Sandpoint, St. Maries, Spirit Lake, Blackfoot and in eastern Washington.

George Williams' buildings were designed with motifs from the renaissance and colonial styles, which featured simple classical lines with contracting rounded arches. Many of his buildings are still with us today and have the honor of being on the National Register of Historic places.

Masonic Temple, 524 Sherman Ave.

George Williams designed the Masonic Temple at 524

Sherman Ave. The two-story brick Renaissance Revival style building was built between 1909 and 1911. Williams was a 32nd degree Mason and a member of the Idaho consistory, Scottish Rite Masons. He was both a York and Scottish Mason. George Williams died December 22, 1929, at age 70, while tying up Christmas presents at his home at 713 N. Seventh. He had spent the last year and a half of his life as the custodian of the building he designed. Fire in 1938 destroyed many interior features. Today, it is privately owned and the entrance has been altered. National Register of Historic Places in 1972.

Roosevelt School, 105 E. Wallace Ave.

The Roosevelt Elementary School, built in 1905, was one of the first buildings Williams designed in Coeur d'Alene. It is both Queen Anne and Romanesque in character. At the time it was the only school in Coeur d'Alene to have a bell. Today's bell tower is a reconstruction. It had two stories above ground, a daylight

basement and an attic where two potbelly stoves were located and was possibly somebody's residence, perhaps the janitor during the early years of the school. It was a four-room schoolhouse with two classrooms on each level. The basement was a lunchroom and indoor recess area and had a small stage for school productions as well as the janitor workroom. When indoor plumbing came along the boy's and girl's restrooms were also located in the basement. With only the four classrooms, by the late 1960s when all elementary schools offered K-6 grades, The Roosevelt no longer could meet the educational space required and was closed in the spring of 1972.

It was placed on the National Historical Register in 1972. With the windows boarded up, the Roosevelt School sat vacant for eight years and was used as a storage facility for the school district. In 1979 Janos Marias purchased the building and did a soft remodel, making two floors into three, dividing the classrooms in half and making eight offices. The offices opened in 1982 and were used until 1992. Mr. Marias then decided to turn the structure into a Bed and Breakfast and spent another two years remodeling the building yet again.

As a school, the building only had one staircase, so when renovations were being done a second egress was required for fire code, also the American Disability Act required access to the upper floors by elevator. However, to remain on the National the outer facade of a building has to remain in character. So, a quandary ensued, how could the requirements be met but still keep its historic designation? A separate free standing structure was built adjacent to the school on top of the foundations of the old coal house, this

would house the new staircase and elevator, illuminating the old wrought iron fire escape that came off the back of the building. Because it is not "attached" to the original structure (the only thing that connects the 2 structures is caulk) all entities were satisfied and The Roosevelt Inn opened in December of 1994, with 22 guest rooms and 19 bathrooms.

John and Tina Hough purchased the property in 1999 and are the current owners. Since then other renovations have been made to fully utilize the structure, the lunchroom is now a meeting facility and the attic is the owner's apartment. The playgrounds are lush gar-

dens with patios and fountains and have become one of the premier historic spots to get married in Coeur d'Alene. The Inn consists of 14 suites and rooms with private baths. John is a native of Coeur d'Alene and attended the Roosevelt School along with all of his siblings. John's father (well-known radio personality, Bob Hough) also served as the PTA president during the late 1950s.

The Davey House, 315 Wallace Ave.

In 1908 bricks were being used in public and commercial buildings in Coeur d'Alene but very few houses were made of brick. Harvey Davey, a bricklayer from Sandpoint, wanted to advertise both his skills as a bricklayer and contractor. His trademark, as with all masons, was the pattern of bricks he laid above every window and door. If you look about town you will see other buildings of his downtown and several churches in the area. Davey hired George Williams to design this new building.

Originally the house at 315 Wallace was built as a boarding house run by his wife, Carrie. There were five rooms on the second floor and one bathroom. There was a dance studio on the third floor which served as a public dance studio until the early 1920s. The building features dark mahogany interior and a full basement with an uncut quarry-stone foundation and basement walls.

After World War I the third floor was converted into three apartments, housing "roomers" rather than "boarders" (people who ate at least one meal per day on the main floor, prepared by Mrs. Davey). The apartments each had a sink, fridge, and burner units

in them which were still there in the 1980s when purchased by Kris and Bob McIlvenna.

In the 1940s Northern Pacific Railway owned the house and used it as a residence for the executives of the railway as they were building through Coeur d'Alene.

In the 1950s a private family owned the property and rented out the 8 rooms upstairs to largely single workingmen in the area. At that time it was named the Wallace Apartments.

In the 1960s it was the headquarters for Health, Education and Welfare. Also Northline Mental Services used the building at the same period of time. There were 14 offices in the building, as evidenced by the 14-line rotary phone system that was found later in the building.

The Tridentine Church of Spokane used the building to house over thirty nuns and operate a daycare for parishioners in the 1970s. Many know these church followers as the "Blue Army" because the women (nuns) and their students (novitiates) wore a dark blue habit and blue and white head coverings. This order was soon to be relocated into Spokane and by the early 1980s the building had been vacant for several years. There was much damage to the building from frozen pipes and neglect.

In 1984, Bob and Kris McIlvenna and their family,

Gwen (9) and Sean (newborn) moved in and began repairs and restoration. The building is on the National Register of Historic Places and has been completely restored and updated since their opening as the Greenbriar Inn, April 1, 1985. It is richly decorated in both period and eclectic furniture pieces. 2008 was the 100th year anniversary for this building. 2015 is the 30th year of ownership for Bob and Kris McIlvenna

Presently the Greenbriar Inn houses three businesses: Lodging (B and B), Catering, and 315 Martinis and Tapas Dinner Restaurant, a European style restaurant specializing in small plates of international origin and expert mixologists for one of the best bars in the area. Exhibit Features Historic Sites

The Museum of North Idaho's feature exhibit *History Outside the Museum* highlights historic buildings, structures and sites in the Coeur d'Alene region. These sites and their stories add life and energy to our communities. Also highlighted are the gone, but not forgotten buildings like the Wilma Theatre. The exhibit looks at the role of the National Register of Historic Places and other agencies which help people to preserve and recognize historic places in our community.

The Museum is located adjacent to Coeur d'Alene City Park at 115 Northwest Blvd. Museum hours are Tuesday through Saturday, 11 am-5 pm, The exhibit will run April 1 through October 31st.

A free one-hour parking pass can be requested at the Museum desk. Museum members are admitted free. Admission is \$4.00 for adults, \$1.00 for children 6-16, and children under 6 are free. There is a family rate of \$10.00 for two adults and children under 16. The Museum Store is stocked with regional history books and gifts. Contact the Museum for special openings and for group tours.

Museum of North Idaho Annual Report 2014

The mission of the Museum of North Idaho is to collect, preserve and interpret the history of the Coeur d'Alene Region, and to foster appreciation of the area's heritage. It is through the support of Museum members and the community that the Museum of North Idaho continues to fulfill this mission.

Founded in 1968, the Museum is governed by a membership-elected nine-member Board of Trustees. From April 2014 to April 2015, board members were: President Larry Strobel, Vice President Connie McGee, Treasurer Fred Ostermeyer, Secretary Kim Brown, Wayne Sweney, Kathy Arneson, Dave Eubanks, Don Pischner and Frank Darlington.

Director Dorothy Dahlgren has served on staff since May 1982. Kathy Arneson served as our bookkeeper from October 2008 to October 2014 when Lisa Hunt was hired. Robert Singletary joined us as Public Relations and Marketing Director in May 2012.

The Board set up our endowment fund of \$200,000 with the Idaho Community Foundation providing perpetual income. We passed a conflict of interest policy, an investment policy and an employee contract. We completed an extensive self-study through the Institute of Museum and Library Services which will be used in planning.

Sharing History Building Alliances

5,180 visitors came to the Museum at 115 NW Blvd. from April 1 to Oct. 31, 2014. This was up about 600 visitors from 2013. School attendance was up by 335 with 860 students visiting the Museum. Doug and Deidre Chadderdon, Empire Airlines, Wendell and Teresa Olson, Specialty Tree Service and John Swallow provided funding for buses and student admission. We participated in

the Smithsonian Museum Free Day, and we are a Blue Star Museum providing free admission to active duty military families.

We received an Idaho Humanities grant to hire Savina Darzes to help with the feature exhibit Power to the Farm. Additional support came from Kootenai Electric Co-op, Frame of Mind and North Crest Electric. Steve Sheppard created the permanent exhibit *McEuen Park*.

Robert Singletary worked a third year as Program and Marketing Director. Robert's lectures and tours reached over 1,200 people. Robert worked with businesses, organizations, historical societies and non-profits in our community to build alliances. He organized booths for 14 local historical groups in the Kootenai County Fair Heritage building. He worked with Kootenai County on their lobby exhibit *Kootenai County Takes Shape 1864-1915* which includes a 12-page booklet by the same title. Rhonda Rohde from NIC did all the graphic work for the exhibit panels. We again partnered with Coeur d'Alene Public Library to give programs. Robert's monthly programs *Coeur d'Alene by the Decade* have been a great success. He writes historical articles for several magazines including *Northwest Mining and Timber* and *CdA Magazine*.

Every year many people use the Museum's research library and archive. We have over 30,000 photos on an in-house database. People order photographic reprints for use in research projects, reports and to decorate homes or businesses. Historic photos appear weekly in the *Nickel's Worth*. We created a Museum Facebook page.

Sixty people attended the annual banquet at the Hayden Lake County Club in 2014. John Swallow received the Friend of History award and Jane Robertson was recognized

for recruiting the most museum members. Melissa Newcomer from Kootenai Electric presented *Empowering Our Community* outlining the history of Kootenai Electric.

Publications

Since 1990, the Museum of North Idaho Press has published 24 books. We released two books in 2014: *Trail to Gold: The Pend Oreille Route* by Linda Hackbarth in May and *Historical Spirit Lake, Idaho & Vicinity* by Keith and Jan Spencer in October.

Buildings and Collections

Since 1979, the City has provided our facility next to the City Park rent-free.

We preserve the Fort Sherman Chapel with the help of volunteers, donations from the Coeur d'Alene Athletic Charitable Trust and AA, and event and wedding rentals. The Chapel requires considerable upkeep. In 2014, the sewer line for the bathroom in the basement collapsed forcing us to look at other restroom options. Scott Cranston helped with designing a freestanding restroom to be built in 2015.

Kevin Cornelsen, Titan Enterprises, replaced the railing, sides and lattice on both sets of steps. CDA Builders Supply donated some of the materials.

The Museum owns the building at 705 Lincoln Way but does not own the land. Since 2012 when the railroad abandoned the property, the Bureau of Land Management has been working with the City of Coeur d'Alene to take over the land. We will have to move.

Twenty-nine people donated more than 188 artifacts, photos and archival materials to the Museum.

Sharky's Custom Painting painted the Corliss engine. Rodda Paint donated the paint. The Idaho Heritage Trust partially funded the project.

Museum News

What Have We Been Doing?

Purchased the Storage Building

We purchased an 8,000 square foot metal building at River Ave. and Northwest Blvd. in 1992 for \$47,252, paying it off in 1997. We leased the land from Burlington Northern Railroad (BNSF) for \$17,657.94 annually. We rented out half of the building to pay this lease and expenses. In July 2012, BNSF ceased control of the land. We received a letter dated January 22, 2013, from Jones Land LaSalle on behalf of the BNSF stating that our lease on the land was terminated. We stopped paying the land lease.

Pursued Ownership of the Land

In 2011, the Museum Board pursued the property where the storage building is located for possible use as the new Museum site and to secure the continued use of our building. We contacted the City of Coeur d'Alene, the Bureau of Land Management (BLM), and Lake City Development Corp. We were told we could not apply to acquire the land and the City would be leasing the land from the 4-Corners area to Riverstone. In 2011, NIC purchased the adjacent property nearly up to the door of our storage building.

Kept in Touch With BLM

We knew from the day we purchased the building that someday we would have to leave the building and possibly tear it down. Our BLM contact, Janna Paronto, Realty Specialist, informed us that it was a long process and we would be kept in the loop. The Museum has invested in this building and naturally we did not want to give it up until the time line for the transfer of the property to the City became clear. The only time we received a date that we had to be out of the

building was a letter dated March 23, 2015 from BLM Field Manager Kurt Pavlat informing we had to be out by June 1. Up until this point we felt we were part of the planning process and being kept informed.

Planned For A New Museum

In the early 2000s, the Museum received a Federal grant for \$28,998, \$10,000 from the Coeur d'Alene Tribe and other funds, to hire the architect firm Madsen, Mitchell and Conrad to design a museum facility to consolidate the main museum, the Fort Sherman Museum and the storage. In 2005, we completed the programming and design phase for a 24,000 square foot facility on NW Blvd. and Mullan Rd. (4-Corners) on the assurance from the City that we could build there. In 2008, the City of Coeur d'Alene gave us a Memorandum of Agreement for this property on the condition we raise substantial money by 2011 when the agreement expired.

Hired A Fund Raiser

In July 2008, the Museum hired a development officer. She identified potential donors, increased membership and public awareness. The decline of the economy in late 2008 was a cause for pause. In 2009, the development officer conducted community readiness assessment, interviews with government officials and prominent citizens. Most of them felt the Museum was not well-known enough and not ready for a fundraising campaign. Board members conducted a readiness assessment with about 80 Museum members and found most members supported the NW Blvd. and Mullan Rd. site but felt that it was a rough time to fundraising.

Worked to Build Awareness

After the development officer moved out of the area in July

2009, the Museum followed her recommendation to increase public awareness. We made progress but realized this was more time consuming than our only staff person and the Board could accomplish, so in 2012, we hired Robert Singletary as Program and Marketing Director to continue to build awareness, membership and support for the Museum. His work with businesses, organizations, historical societies and nonprofits in our community has increased public awareness greatly. Museum membership is on the rise with over 700 active members.

Asked City For Land

The Museum's long-range plan called for starting a capital campaign in 2013 contingent on getting a commitment for the 4-Corners site. The Board feels we cannot start fundraising until we have a site. In 2012, the Museum Director Dorothy Dahlgren presented the plans for the facility on the 4-Corners to the Park and Rec Commission. Although supportive, the City would not commit the site to us until the planning process for the 4-Corners, was completed. We were included in planning meetings but it came as a surprise to us in late February 2015, when Miller/Stauffer presented the 4-Corners plan to the public with the Museum in the old brick railroad substation building where the Human Rights Education Institute (HREI) is presently located. The plans call for building the Museum onto the back and to include a basement giving the building 13,000 square feet to be shared with the HREI. A 2004, engineering report made an estimate of \$300,000 to make the foundation and walls secure. Parking is now planned for the location at NW Blvd. and Mullan Rd., and a new Museum building there is off the table.
